ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS — The Xtream Rock Island Grand Prix, the world's largest karting street race to be run Sept. 2-3 through the downtown city streets of Rock Island, this year will feature an announcing team designed to bring a new level of excitement to the event. Jay Kidwell and Carter Pease will tag team this year's exciting race action. Their work will be heard throughout the downtown which is wired for sound, and on the webcast of eKartingNews.com. Both are veterans of many previous Rock Island kart races.

Jay Kidwell joined the WHBF Local 4 News team as sports director in 2001. Previously, he was sports director at the CBS affiliate, WFSB-TV in Hartford Connecticut. Prior to that, Kidwell was a sports anchor/Reporter at WGGB-TV, the ABC affiliate in Springfield, Massachusetts. He is originally from southern Connecticut, and graduated from the University of Hartford with a degree in Mass Communications. He has always had a passion for sports, even as a child when he would listen to baseball games on the radio and pretend to announce the "play by play!" Kidwell enjoys covering local sports teams in the Quad Cities, and says not only does he get to follow the teams, but he also enjoys the opportunity to meet many great students, families, and people throughout the community. He also takes part in many local charity events for organizations such as NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness), The HAVlife Foundation, and The United Way.

Currently he is competing in the World Racing League with Round 3 Racing.
